#### **NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT**

t is a pleasure of mine to always give a summary of last year's activities. It would not have been possible to recover so strongly from the pandemic without the help of many people. Firstly, I thank God for making this program possible for Akron children. Thanks to the parents and players ranging from 5-18 years old. Thanks to the volunteer coaches and thanks to our sponsors.

Last year the program served over 700 diverse populations of players. We registered seven teams both in the spring and fall and as always, many of the teams were champions. The academic report from Summit Education Initiative (SEI) was encouraging as our players showed more improvement over the students not in our program attending Akron Public Schools. The summer camp was one of the best with an increase of 5-10 years old. Thanks to Sarah Deisler and Carrier Burrier from the Akron Public Library and Mr. & Mrs. Chuck Bell from Children and Book (CAB) for providing the books throughout the summer. The opportunity had prevented lesson loss among our participants during the summer which is always common among children who may not have the means of attending a quality program during the summer.

Our players are always called upon by Tom Turner, The Director of Membership Growth & Development of Ohio Soccer Association (OSA) to assist in coaching education, this is due in part to their high-level soccer knowledge and skills



#### 2021 SUMMER CAMP REPORT FROM SEI

As one of the partners of United Way of Summit & Medina Bold Goals Initiative 2018-2025, we continue to monitor our participants attendance and academic records to make sure they are on track to graduate on time and be college or career ready. "We believe that high-quality summer programs that focus on both academic and social-emotional development have the power to reduce or eliminate achievement gaps that occur from summer learning loss" SEI.

#### **SUMMARY OF THE RESULT**

#### **IMPROVED ATTENDANCE**

The average absences for your summer program (2.2) were lesser than the district absences (3.6) but similar to all summer programs (2.2) post-summer. Students in your program had excellent attendance patterns in school and your summer program. A significant majority (88%) of vour students with a history of perfect attendance maintained that level of excellent attendance during the period of the 2021 school year. A first marking considerable number of your students (90%) who had attendance before attending your program started the 2021 school year with excellent attendance. More than two-thirds (67%) of your students with acceptable attendance improved to an excellent attendance pattern post-summer. This sustenance and increase in excellent attendance among your typical, perfect, and high-risk attendance students, respectively, can enhance educational success during the course of the 2021-2022 school year.

#### SCHOOL-BASED ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

#### **GRADE POINT AVERAGE**

Academically, your students' Spring to fall GPA patterns are better than all summer programs or the district GPA patterns, as indicated in the previous section of this report. A significant majority (80%) of your students who achieved high GPAs before the program sustained the academic performance and started the school year with low-risk high achieving GPAs. One-fourths of your students with average performing GPAs at the end of the 2020 school year made considerable gains and had high achieving GPAs at the beginning of the 2021 school year. However, 70% of your low-achieving students sustained low performances even in the fall of the 2021 school year.





#### I-READY ASSESSMENTS - READING

Post-summer, both average (39) and median (36) percentile scores in reading for students in your program were higher than the district or all summer programs. Close to one-finish (19%) of your average performing students at the end of the 2020 school year made gains in reading and had significantly above average reading performance at the beginning of the 2021 school year. Similarly, one-fourth (24%) of your below-average students improved their reading performances to average scores post summer.
